One day, Tumi was throwing a tennis ball for Simba. As she scratched his neck, her fingers felt something small and hard.

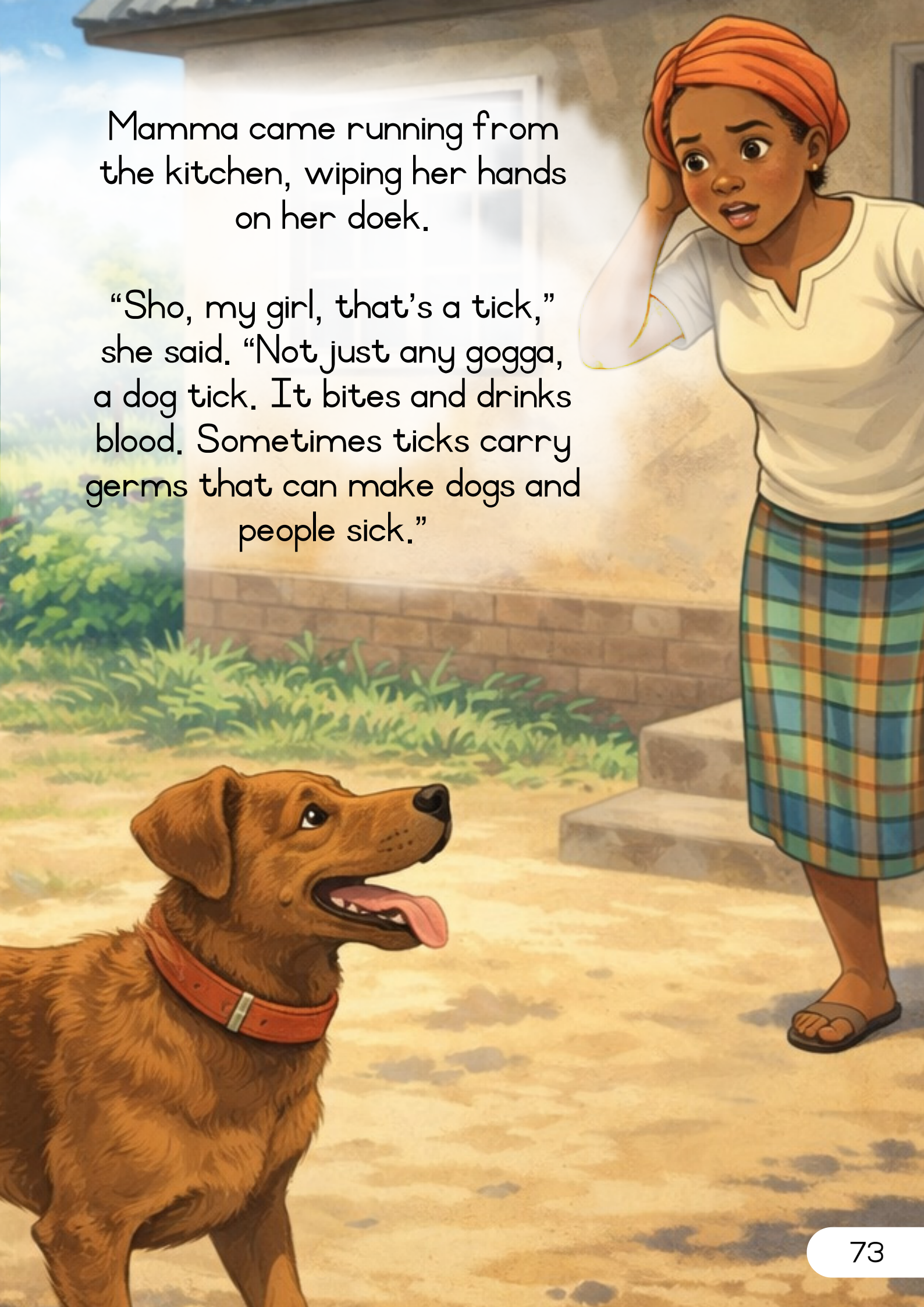
“Ag, what gogga is this?” she muttered.
