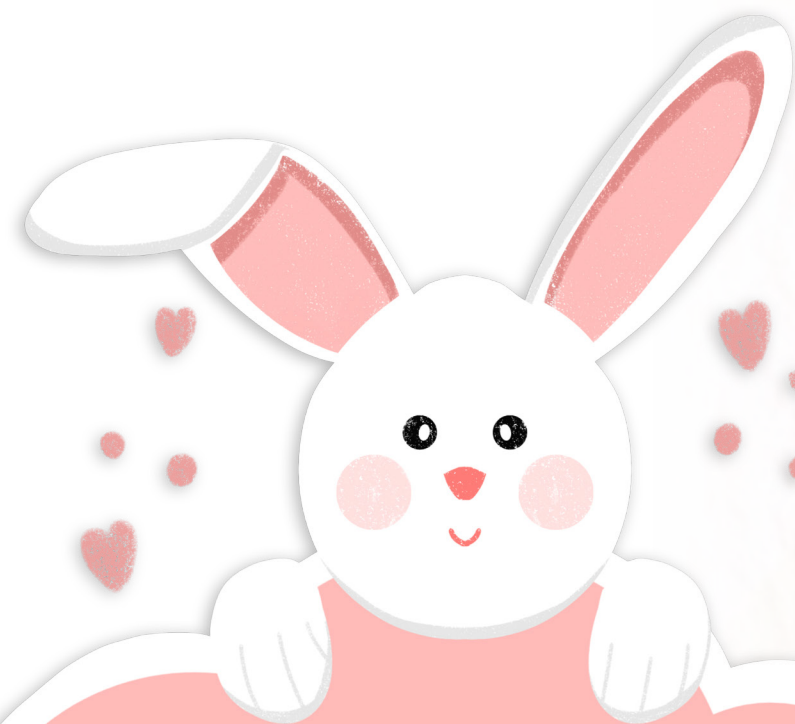




Tina and the Bunny Adventure
